

Moodie G, Wheelahan L. Colleges as anchors of their communities:
 emergence and agglomeration. Journal of Vocational Education & Training 2025;77:58–80.

Argues that colleges act as anchor institutions in their communities by developing knowledge and skills, establishing links and exchanges outside the region, contributing to civic, political, cultural, and social activities and networks, developing facilities and amenities used by the community and contributing to economic activity.

• Toulmin V, Tait M, Warwick T, Dobson J. Anchor institutions in the changing city: The university's role in shaping the Future High Street. JURR 2025;18:410. Contributes to debates on the role of UK universities within cities and develops a broader understanding of them as anchor institutions. Examines the role of universities as anchor institutions in shaping the future of urban centres, at a time when high streets are continuing to face significant challenges.

The benefits of health services as anchor institutions is becoming increasingly relevant in the current political and economic climate. This article summarises the process and learning from an anchors approach developed in Barts Health NHS Trust, one of the largest NHS Trusts in England.

Based on case study research in Greater Manchester, this article demonstrates how discussions around inclusive growth and inclusive economies have challenged the city's historical agglomeration-based model.
- Hughes C, Lupton R. Understanding inclusive growth at local level: changing patterns and types of neighbourhood disadvantage in three English cityregions. Cambridge Journal of Regions, Economy and Society 2021;14:141–56. Argues that efforts to promote inclusive growth should be rooted in an understanding of the experiences of different people and places. Provides analysis of changes in the ways that poorer neighbourhoods in three English city-regions are linked to the wider economy.

• Lee N. Inclusive Growth in cities: a sympathetic critique. Reg Stud 2018; 53:1–11.

The concept of 'Inclusive Growth' has become popular in local economics. Some policy-makers are enthusiastic, others argue it is a buzzword which changes little. The article summarizes and critiques this agenda.
